


Cerbat Foothills Recreation Area


User Guidelines

Please stay on designated trails - Avoid wet or muddy trails - Keep to the right of the trail; save the left for passing - Always announce your intentions when passing - All downhill traffic yields to uphill traffic Approach each turn as if someone were around the corner - Keep pets under control and/or on a leash

Access





Water: 2 quarts per hour Food: carry a snack **Footwear:** sturdy hiking boots Other items to consider: backpack, first aid kit, map, flashlight, spray bottle, GPS unit, hat, and sunscreen.

While planning your trip, be sure to check with the nearest BLM office for more information about local conditions, regulations, and recreation resources.

Metwell Trailhead: Follow I-40 West to US-93 North

/ West Beale Street in Kingman. Take exit 48 north

from I-40 West. Turn left on Metwell Drive and

continue down the road for 0.3 miles. Turn right at

the Monolith Gardens Trailhead sign.

Weather: Temperatures from May to September can oftentimes exceed 100°F. During this time lightning can be present from summer monsoon storms. These storms are usually in the afternoon and can bring significant amounts of rain and lightning. Flash flooding can occur. Verify weather conditions on the NOAA website before departing.

Badger Trailhead: Follow I-40 West to US-93 North / West Beale Street in Kingman. Take exit 48 north from I-40 West. Continue on US-93 for 4.2 miles. Turn right into the Badger Trailhead parking area located just after the US-93 / State Route 68 interchange.

Camp Beale Loop Trailhead: Follow 1-40 West to US-93 North / West Beale Street in Kingman. Take exit 48 north from I-40 West. Turn right on Fort Beale Drive, continue for 1.3 miles and turn left up the steep paved hill for 0.3 miles. Parking is on the right.

Coyote Pass Trailhead: Follow I-40 West to US-93 North / West Beale Street in Kingman. Take exit 48 north from I-40 West. Continue on US-93 for 5.9 miles. Use the Agua Fria Drive crossover to proceed back south on US-93 towards Kingman. Continue on US-93 for 4.1 miles. Using the turn lane, turn right into the Coyote Pass Trailhead parking area.

Cerbat Foothills Recreation Area (CFRA) - History and Resources

Cooperative Management: The 11,300 acre CFRA is a mixture of Federal, state, county, city, and private lands. A management plan for the area was approved in 1995 by the City of Kingman and BLM. The plan sets a framework for long-term cooperative management of city and BLM managed lands for recreational purposes.

Cultural Resources: Human occupations in this area dates back to at least 4,000 years. Late Archaic, Cerbat, Cohonina, and Hualapai people lived here. In 1871, the United States Army built a military post at Camp Beale Springs and established a temporary reservation for the Hualapai Tribe in this area.

Wildlife & Vegetation: This area provides habitat for mule deer, Sonoran Desert tortoise, coyotes, foxes, Gambel's quail, mourning dove, several types of raptors, and many smaller mammals, birds, and reptiles. Vegetation includes a variety of desert species native to Mohave Desert scrub/semi-desert grasslands. Examples of native plant species include yucca, beavertail cactus, prickly pear cactus, creosote, and mesquite.

Grazing: Please be mindful and cautious of cattle and associated grazing operations as you recreate on BLM managed lands. If you encounter cattle, please remain calm, do not harass them and give the cattle ample space and time to move along. Leave all gates in the position you found them. If you suspect a gate should be open that is closed, please notify the BLM Kingman Field Office.
