The Rome Launch Site

The Rome launch Site is the primary launch site for rafting the Owyhee Wild and Scenic River (WSR). It consists of a launch ramp, restrooms, potable water, eight camp sites, picnic area, informational kiosk, and a parking area. Recreation fees collected from commercial outfitters operating on the Owyhee WSR were used to support improvements made to the site. Improvements consisted of grading the boat ramp, graveling the site, installing new tables, fire rings, and planting shade trees.

Chukar Park Campground



Chukar Park Campground

Chukar Park Campground is located along the North Fork Malheur River, 6 miles north of Juntura, Oregon. The site's amenities include 19 campsites, vault toilets, tables, fire rings drinking water and kiosks. Visitors consist predominately of a mix of people traveling on U.S. Highway 20 and people fishing and hunting in the area. Collected recreation fees support a camp host whose duties include maintaining toilets, mowing, watering lawns, and general campground maintenance.

Amount Expended: \$5,054.00

Recreation Fee Dollars

They support and enhance:

- Maintenance, repair, and facility enhancement related directly to visitor enjoyment, visitor access, and health and safety
- Interpretation, visitor information, visitor service, visitor needs assessments, and signs
- Habitat restoration directly related to wildlife- dependent recreation that is limited to hunting, fishing, wildlife observation, or photography
- Law enforcement related to public use and recreation
- Direct operating/capital costs associated with the recreation fee program

Purchased trash service and portable toilet rental for dispersed camping areas on the Owyhee River below Owyhee Dam.

Purchased cleaning supplies and toilet paper for BLM vault toilets at recreation sites.

Purchased signs for the 3-Forks Recreation site.
