Education Tip: Have you ever wondered how plants survive in the Mojave Desert? The plants

in our Mojave Desert have many adaptations that help them survive and thrive. Some adaptations include having small leaves that help reduce the amount of water loss. Some plants have leaves with a thick, waxy covering like sunscreen. The prickly plants with hair and spines, use those features to shade themselves plant and to break up drying winds. Those are the adaptations we can see. Below the surface, some plants have shallow roots to capture any precipitation while some plants have deep taproots to reach groundwater. Next time you hike in the desert, make sure to take some time to appreciate the amazing plants that surround you.

Fun Fact: Once upon a midnight dreary, while I pondered, weak and weary... I wondered do Ravens make good fathers? While many stories make Ravens seem evil or scary, the male Ravens make great fathers! The male Raven helps to build its yearly nest, bring food to its young, and defend their territory. This month let's appreciate fathers and everything they do for their children.
