Education Tip: The Fourth of July is a time to celebrate freedom, liberty, and independence. Many celebrate this holiday with the tradition of setting off fireworks, a tradition that has roots starting in 1777. Today, setting off fireworks on public lands is prohibited year-round. The reason for this restriction is to prevent human-caused wildfires. "The single highest number of wildfires ignitions occurs on the 4th of July" (Auburn University). The fireworks and the landscape have greatly changed since 1777. Today, we recommend watching controlled firework shows in your area so we can protect the landscape and wildlife we all love. <u>Friendly Reminder</u>: Please remember to hike safely. We do not recommend hiking when temperatures are above 90°F. To encourage hiking in cooler temperatures, Sloan Canyon changed its gate hours for the summer. New summer hours are: 8am-12pm Monday to Thursday and 7am-12pm Friday to Sunday.

Etiquette Principle: With daily temperatures averaging 100°F some of us may think adding bowls of water on public lands will help wildlife. While good intentioned, adding bowls of water on public lands is harmful for wildlife. These bowls of water can become a breeding ground for bacteria and disease. They can attract wildlife to an area with humans (which usually does not end well for the animal), and sometimes wildlife can then become dependent on humans. Nevada Department of Wildlife (NDOW) helps BLM to manage wildlife and have installed water guzzlers in key areas across public lands to help wildlife.
