Mission

Our mission is to prudently manage and monetize the University's real property to support education, research, and public service, including funding for the **UA Scholars Program**.

We manage 150,000 acres of land holdings

- 138,000 acres of investment property
- 12,000 acres for our campuses and research



What We Do

From Ketchikan to Kotzebue, the UA Land team manages a **blended portfolio**.

- natural resource development
- land sales and leases
- alternative revenue streams including conservation easements and a potential carbon sequestration program.

We also support campuses with their real estate needs.



Our Impact

- Since 1987, the UA Land team has generated more than \$242.9 million through land sales, leases, permits, easements, and resource development of timber, oil, gas, mining, and material sales.
- The largest beneficiary of the proceeds from UA land holdings is the UA Scholars program, which awards \$12,000 scholarships to the top ten percent of high school graduates in Alaska each year. To date, nearly 10,000 Alaska students have benefitted from this scholarship.



UA Scholar Stories

Luke Rogers, UA Scholar & UAF Graduate

The UA Scholars Award greatly offset the cost of Luke's higher education in Alaska. With the same determination he had growing up, and with scholarship money in hand, Luke got to work learning all he could about science, math, and just for fun, wildlife management. It was a unique combination of courses he could only find at UAF.

Luke later joined the team that reintroduced the first wild, wood bison population in the United States.

Land Grant Overview

For years, the University of Alaska has sought a remedy to our significant land grant deficit.

The spending package passed by Congress at the end of 2022 included the University of Alaska Fiscal Foundation Act, which finally created a process for us to receive those **360,000 acres of outstanding lands**.

Revenue from our land holdings funds important programs like **UA Scholars**, helping educate Alaskans statewide.




Our History: Land Grant University

- Starting in the late 1880's the land grant system was created throughout the country so that working class people could obtain an education.
- In 1915, federal legislation granted land to the Territory of Alaska. However, through the process of statehood, only a small percentage of the federal grant lands were conveyed to the University of Alaska.
- Thanks to legislation at the end of 2022, we now have a path forward to receiving our outstanding 360,000 acres.



Who benefits?

The largest beneficiary of the proceeds from UA land holdings is the UA Scholars program, which awards \$12,000 scholarships to the top ten percent of high school graduates in Alaska each year. The conveyance of outstanding lands will secure this important investment in Alaska's future.
