Understanding Assessments: The Comprehensive Animal Welfare Program aims to promote the welfare of wild horses and burros during management activities while minimizing stress and ensuring humane care, handling and treatment. CAWP assessments evaluate compliance with standards during the activities taking place at the time of the assessment. This framework helps ensure a clear and unbiased evaluation of events or actions as they occur. Here are some key points:

- Holistic Approach: Assessments reflect the entirety of the activity, not targeting individuals or specific groups.
- Time-Specific: The evaluation focuses solely on the observed circumstances during the assessment period.
- Limitations: Previous or subsequent events are not accounted for, meaning the assessment is a standalone observation.

General Notes from the CAWP Team at the Buffalo Hills Complex Wild Horse and Burro Gather: Coordination and Communication

- Gather Team Collaboration: There was excellent cooperation among the gather team, which included staff from BLM, APHIS, and contractors.
- Knowledge of Standards: The gather team was knowledgeable about the CAWP standards.

Gather Techniques

 Pressure and Release: There was effective use of pressure and release techniques while guiding wild horses to the trap.

Decision Making

- Roping Consideration: Roping of wild horses was tried two times. The wild horses were
 located outside the herd management area boundaries, in an area that is not identified
 for the management of wild horses.
- Outcome: The roping of one mare was successful while following the standards for roping. The mare was not tied down or in a recumbent position during the roping operation. The mare was marked for identification, loaded in the horse trailer and transported to temporary holding. The mare was evaluated by the onsite veterinarian at the trap and again at temporary holding. The second attempt at roping was not successful and the wild horse evaded capture.

Conditions found to be in non-compliance with the CAWP Standards for Wild Horse and Burro Gathers:

Dependent foals or weak/debilitated animals must be separated from other WH&Bs at the trap site to avoid injuries during transportation to the temporary holding facility. Separation of dependent foals from mares must not exceed four hours unless the Lead COR/COR/PI authorizes a longer time or a decision is made to wean the foals.

Non-Compliance: When transporting wild horses from the trap to temporary holding, three foals that were determined to be weaned were shipped in a compartment with a stallion wild horse.
